Chamber Backs Hotel Tax: Measure MM

At its July meeting, the Chamber Board voted to support a 2 percent increase to the City's transient occupancy tax (TOT), a tax levied on individuals who stay in hotel or motel rooms for 30 days or less. If approved by a majority of the voters, this increase would raise the TOT rate, often referred to as a "hotel tax," from 8 percent to 10 percent, on par with that of neighboring communities.

Background: Fremont is faced with limited resources, as are many of us, largely determined by outside factors. resulting in insufficient resources to

maintain desirable service levels for public safety, street maintenance, and local services. Despite cutting operating expenses, leaving vacancies unfilled, and focusing on economic development, the City still has a real need for additional revenue sources locally-controlled and not subject to State take-away – in order to maintain fundamental City services during uncertain times.

In June, City Council members expressed interest in increasing local sources of revenue to augment the General Fund, specifically to safeguard spending related to public safety

and street maintenance. In evaluating potential options, the Council discussed raising Fremont's transient occupancy tax above its current 8 percent. Newark and Milpitas are both at 10 percent, and Union City is at 10.18 percent. Oakland's is 11 percent, San Jose's 10 percent, and San Francisco's 14 percent.

Over a period of several weeks, the Council considered increasing the tax

Chamber Weighs in on November Ballot Measures

The November 4th ballot has twelve State initiatives on it, along with several local measures. It is the responsibility of the Government Affairs Committee of the Fremont Chamber to review these measures to determine whether to recommend a position to the Chamber Board of Directors, but it is the Board of Directors that ultimately votes whether to support, oppose or take no position on any given measure.

In determining whether to take a position, the Board considers whether the measure will have a clear and direct impact on the local business environment, the economic vitality of our area, or the overall quality of life in Fremont. In some cases, it is obvious that the measure will have significant impact to Fremont's business climate and economic development efforts, but in other cases, the measure may have more of an impact on the overall quality of life in Fremont. In those cases, the Government Affairs Committee and Chamber Board evaluate how significantly the quality of life issue will influence business and employee location and retention decisions.

With that in mind, the Chamber Board voted to take positions on five of the twelve measures on the November ballot. A summary of each of these measures and the rationale for the Board's positions follows:

Proposition 1A: Safe, Reliable **High-Speed Passenger Train Bond**

CHAMBER POSITION: SUP-PORT

Summary: Proposition 1A asks voters to approve the issuance of \$9.95 billion of general obligation bonds to partially fund a \$40 billion, 800-mile high speed train linking Southern California, the Sacramento/San Joaquin Valley, and the San Francisco Bay Area. Ninety percent of the bond funds are to be spent on specific projects, with matching federal and private matching funds required before any State funds are released. The system would be designed to use electric trains

and sustain speeds of no less than 200 miles/hour. All bond funds would be subject to independent audits.

Fiscal Impact: Assuming 30 years to pay off principal and interest, payments would average about \$647 million per year. Unknown operation and maintenance costs would be at least partially, and potentially fully, offset by passenger fares.

Supporters Say: High speed rail (HSR) would:

• increase mobility, yet cost about 1/3 of what it would cost to provide the

to various levels, including up to 13 percent, and it also considered a multi-step increase.

While supportive of the City's need for additional revenue, the Chamber is also very aware that our local hotels compete with surrounding cities for customers. In response to opposition from the Chamber and local hotels to raising the tax above that of our neighbors, thereby placing our hotels at a competitive disadvantage, the Council decided on the current language of the measure, now known as Measure

Measure Description: Measure MM increases Fremont's Transient Occupancy Tax from 8 percent to 10 percent, effective January 1, 2009, if approved by a majority of the voters. This would raise our TOT rate to the same level as

our neighboring communities but does not place us at a competitive disadvantage by going beyond that. Effectively, on a room rate of \$100 per night, a hotel guest would pay an additional \$2 if this measure passes

Benefit Description: For fiscal year 2007/08, Fremont's TOT revenue (from the current 8 percent tax) is projected to be \$3.2 million. Each 1 percent increase in the TOT rate is projected to increase revenue by \$400K, so the proposed increase from 8 percent to 10 percent is projected to increase General Fund revenue by \$800K.

While funds added to the General Fund are not restricted in their use, the Council has indicated its intent to use these incremental funds for public safety and street maintenance. This also aligns with the current allocation of General Fund

resources; today 89 percent of the General Fund revenues are allocated to police, fire, and park and street maintenance.

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. The Fremont Chamber of Commerce places its highest priority on promoting and enhancing a healthy and positive business environment, and we also believe that preserving police, fire and street maintenance services is critical to a thriving business economy. We believe that Measure MM appropriately balances the need of the City for additional funding for key services with the needs of the business community - specifically our hotels - to remain competitive. The Chamber encourages you to vote YES on Measure MM.

same level of mobility and service with highway and airport improvements

- remove tens of thousands of cars from our highways, reduce air travel, reduce emissions, protect our air
- create 160K construction-related jobs, many permanent jobs
- link our major population centers through an integrated transportation system
- reduce dependence on foreign oil

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. The Fremont Chamber of Commerce ranks both transportation infrastructure and environmental sustainability among its priorities, and considers this measure an investment in California's future. An economic study just released on October 2nd by the Bay Area Council Economic Institute, projects that the California High-Speed Rail System will generate over 100,000 jobs in the Bay Area alone during construction. and 48,000 permanent jobs by 2030, while significantly reducing the second worst traffic congestion in the Country. The study also estimates that HSR construction costs will be less than half the cost of expanding airports and highways.

Proposition 7: Renewable Energy Generation

CHAMBER POSITION: OPPOSE

Summary: Proposition 7 requires government-owned utilities to generate 20 percent of their electricity from renewable energy by 2010, a standard currently applicable to private electrical corporations. It raises requirement for all utilities to 40 percent by 2020 and 50 percent by 2025, and imposes penalties for non-compliance.

Fiscal Impact: Increased state administrative costs up to \$3.4 million annually for regulatory activities, paid by fees. Unknown impact on state and local government costs.

Supporters Say:

- Prop 7 assures that by 2025 half the electricity in California will come from solar and clean energy resources.
- · We cannot afford NOT to do this.

Supporters Include: S. David Freeman, energy expert who wrote first U.S. energy policy; State Senator Liz Figueroa (ret); State Senator Pro Tem John Burton (ret) www.yeson7.net

Opponents Say:

- While a renewable energy target is desirable, this is too aggressive and well beyond targets for implementing the greenhouse emissions reduction law. AB 32.
- Prop 7 is poorly drafted.
- It will not achieve its stated goals and will actually disrupt renewable power development.
- It will force small renewable energy companies out of California's market through a 'competition elimination' provision.
- It has potential to substantially drive up energy prices.
- It has unworkable mandates.

Chamber Position: OPPOSE. While the Chamber has identified environmental sustainability as one of its priorities, this measure attempts to do too much, too quickly with some potentially fatal flaws, however well-intentioned it may be.

Proposition 10: Alternative Fuel Vehicles and Renewable Energy CHAMBER POSITION: OPPOSE

Summary: Proposition 10 authorizes \$5 billion in bonds paid from the state's General Fund, to help consumers and others purchase certain high fuel economy and alternative fuel vehicles, and to fund research in renewable energy and alternative fuel vehicles

Fiscal Impact: State cost of about \$10 billion over 30 years to repay bonds. Increased state and local revenues, potentially totaling several tens of millions of dollars through 2019. Potential state administrative costs up to about \$10 million annually.

Supporters Say: Proposition 10 will reduce California's dependence on foreign oil by providing needed funding to:

- Generate electricity from renewable sources
- Provide consumer rebates for purchase or lease of clean alternative fuel vehicles, including hybrids, electric vehicles, and fuel-efficient vehicles
- Replace older polluting diesel trucks with clean alternative fuel trucks
- Fund research and development of cheaper & cleaner fuels

Supporters Include: T. Boone Pickens (Clean Energy Fuels company); Ron Dellums, Mayor, City of Oakland www.prop10yes.com

Opponents Say:

- The use of bonds for these purposes is not an appropriate use of bond funds
- This measure is funded by T. Boone Pickens, owner of Clean Energy Fuels Corp, and is a self-serving initiative that stands to benefit Pickens company
- The measure was not crafted by a broad enough base of individuals to properly vet it
- Prop 10 does not allow all technologies to compete for taxpayer dollars

Opponents Include: California Chamber of Commerce; Consumer Federation of California; League of Women Voters; Mercury News; Consumer Watchdog; California Federation of Teachers; California Labor Federation www.noonproposition10.org

Chamber Position: OPPOSE. While the Chamber has identified environmental sustainability as one of its priorities, we do not believe that under writing the cost for individuals and businesses to purchase low emission and high fuel efficiency vehicles is an appropriate use of State bond funds. Based on information we have collected, we also have serious concerns about the ability of this measure to achieve its stated goals.

Proposition 11: Redistricting. Initiative Constitutional Amendment and Statute.

CHAMBER POSITION: SUP-PORT

Summary: This measure is an amendment to the California Constitution that changes the authority for redrawing state district boundaries from elected legislators to a commission. It establishes a multilevel process to select commissioners from the registered voter pool, creating a commission comprised of Democrats, Republicans, and representatives of neither party.

Background: State legislators currently have the power to redraw their own districts every 10 years, after the Census. This process is called redistricting. The offices that would be impacted are the California Senate, Assembly, and Board of Equalization.

Fiscal Impact: Per Legislative Analyst's office, no significant impact in state redistricting costs.

Supporters Say: The current redistricting process results in a 99 percent reelection rate, giving little incentive for lawmakers to be responsive and accountable. They say that Prop 11 will:

• ensure an open and transparent redistricting process that respects exist-

ing city and county boundarieschange the process so that it will no

longer be controlled by the party in power

- increase accountability and responsiveness among our elected officials
- result in more competitive elections

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. The Fremont Chamber believes it is a conflict of interest for existing legislators to redraw their own district boundaries, and strongly supports this initiative. By making the outcomes of elections less certain (through reducing 'safe' seats), redistricting has the potential to provide greater leverage and voice for the business community.

Proposition 12: Veterans Bond Act of 2008 CHAMBER POSITION: SUP-PORT

Summary: Proposition 12 authorizes the State to sell \$900 million in General Obligation bonds for the Cal-Vet program. These bonds would provide

sufficient funds for at least 3,600 additional veterans to receive loans.

Background: Over the past 85 years, there have been 26 Veterans Bond Acts, and Californians have consistently recognized the debt we owe to those who have served. Over 420K veterans have been helped during this time. The Cal-Vet program enables veterans to obtain low cost loans for the purchase of conventional homes, manufactured homes. and mobile homes without costing the taxpavers one cent. All costs of the program are paid by veterans holding loans. As these bonds are repaid by the veterans, new bonds must be authorized.

Fiscal Impact: Costs of about \$1.8 billion to pay off both the principal and interest would be paid by participating veterans.

Supporters Say: The program is good for the economy because, in addition to helping veterans, Cal-Vet loans generate thousands of housing industry-related jobs.

Supporters Include: California Chamber of Commerce; placed on ballot by unanimous vote of State Assembly and Senate

Opponents Say: No organized opposition

Opponents: No organized opposition

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. This program supports our veterans by helping them assimilate successfully back into our communities. It generates housing-related jobs thereby stimulating the economy. The program is self-supporting and does not impact overall bond indebtedness for the state.



He has been a champion of economic development in Fremont, and was a strong supporter of a recent trade mission to China, recognizing that Fremont's diverse community creates an ideal environment for global companies to locate here. He has also hosted several trade missions from China.

Wasserman notes with pride the retail and other projects that have occurred during his tenure. The past four years have seen the development of Pacific Commons into the top retail center in Fremont, and the expansion of restaurant and retail offerings throughout Fremont. In speaking with BGG, Bob noted that property taxes alone cannot provide the level of services and amenities we need and want, and that increasing our sales tax revenue is critical to doing so.

As Mayor, Bob was instrumental in getting the Oakland A's serious about a move to Fremont, and continues to share the Fremont Chamber's belief that having a major league team based in our City will bring a level of prestige to Fremont that will attract visitors and commerce alike. He describes the proposed Ballpark Village as a mini Santana Row (the prestigious shopping/living

district in San Jose). "Eventually, it will cause other things to happen – like a Performing Arts Center. It will contribute in unbelievable ways, but we will make the decision based on facts," Wasserman stated, adding that he would not vote to move forward with the project if the EIR and business terms show that it would not be good for the City.

Wasserman also points with pride to the progress made in the area of transportation during his tenure, noting specifically the 1-880 & Mission Blvd. interchange project and the Washington Blvd grade separation project. In addition to providing congestion relief and greater accessibility to key retail and industrial areas,

these projects also facilitate the Warm Springs BART extension and a future Irvington BART station. Over the past several months. Mayor Wasserman has successfully advocated for regional support of a proposal to close the funding gap for BART to Warm Springs, contacting regional agencies and mayors and soliciting the Fremont business community's help in advocating for this proposal.

Wasserman lists his priorities as public safety; strengthening our economy by attracting new business and creating jobs at all income levels; and creating an

environmentally sustainable community. He pledges to continue to seek ways to increase funding for police and firefighters, and notes that he commissioned a green task force to identify ways to make Fremont more environmentally friendly. When asked about what approaches he would support to help "green" Fremont, Bob noted that he would prefer not to mandate actions that are a hardship for businesses and residents, but would rather encourage and facilitate voluntary steps. He added that he will also focus on creating "green collar jobs" and attracting businesses that are developing ways to help people reduce their carbon footprint.

Lastly, Bob has proven to be a strong friend to the Chamber and the Fremont business community, attending Chamber board meetings on a regular basis to hear Chamber concerns and share City news and plans. He has actively sought Chamber advice and support on various issues. His priorities related to economic development, transportation infrastructure, and quality of life are all priorities of the Fremont Chamber.



What is Business for Good Government (BGG)?

Business for Good Government (BGG) is an affiliated political action committee of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce, authorized by the State of California and the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) to raise funds, endorse candidates, and contribute to ballot measures or candidate campaigns. BGG plays an active role in the support of business interests in local, regional, and state elections.

Officially, BGG is classified by the State of California as "a general purpose sponsored recipient committee of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce." Essentially, this is a political action committee, or PAC, that operates at the state rather than the federal level.

Why was BGG formed?

Formed by the Chamber's Board of Directors in 1995 to help elect candidates who are sensitive to business issues, BGG furthers the business community's efforts to have a voice in the political process. The bylaws of BGG read, "The purpose of BGG is to help protect, preserve, and further good government and foster a political environment which will strengthen the private enterprise system."

BGG is able to raise funds for candidates or to support or oppose ballot measures that impact business. Such activities, if carried out by the Chamber, could jeopardize its tax-exempt nonprofit designation. On the other hand, BGG is legally authorized by the State of California to raise and spend funds for these purposes.

Although the Chamber communicates its legislative priorities and positions on issues to BGG, BGG's endorsements of candidates are made completely independently.

How is BGG structured?

BGG has its own board of directors, independent of the Chamber's board of directors. It has complete control over any endorsements it chooses to make, and since it is responsible for its own fundraising, it also has complete control over its expenditures. BGG trustees serve consecutive one-year terms until resignation or removal, and BGG is completely independent of any political party, political organization, or candidate

What can BGG do?

BGG can endorse and contribute money to candidates or ballot measures. It can promote its endorsements to the Fremont Chamber membership, organize phone banking and other "get out the vote" activities, and spend funds to create campaign materials or events.

When must you re-register?

California has permanent registration. Once you have registered, you need to register again only if:

- 3. You have changed your name and wish to vote under your new name.
- 4. You fail to vote at a statewide General Election. (held in November of even numbered years) and fail to return the postcard sent by the County Registrar of Voters after the election.

Chamber Supports Measure WW: East Bay Regional Parks Bond

The Chamber Board cast its support for Measure WW, the East Bay Parks Bond, at its September meeting, acknowledging that this is one of those measures that enhances our community as a whole and makes it more attractive to both current and prospective employers and employees alike

Summary:

Measure WW is an extension of Measure AA, passed 20 years ago, and it is intended to provide continued funding for regional park land acquisition, new park and trail development, habitat and urban creek restoration and rehabilitation of aging park facilities. A citizens' oversight committee will ensure that Measure WW funds will be spent as promised.

Background:

In 1988 voters approved Measure AA to finance \$225 million of bonds over twenty years to support the East Bay Regional Parks.

In the twenty years, the District has

- Added 34,000 acres of open space
- Used Measure AA funds to acquire state and federal matching funds which have doubled the money available
- · Spent \$44 million in capital funds for

park improvements

- Spent \$56 million for 235 accessible local parks and recreation facilities, including \$4 million for the Oakland Zoo.
- Refinanced the existing Measure AA bonds at a lower interest rate saving over \$8.5 million in present value savings.

Fiscal Impact:

Because this is an extension of Measure AA, it would not cause a tax rate increase but rather continue the current \$10 per \$100,000 assessed valuation.

Supporters Say:

Measure WW will:

- Help preserve our vanishing open space, available parklands, and shoreline for the growing number of residents of Alameda and Contra Costa Counties.
- Promote environmental sustainability. The vegetation in our parks absorbs the same amount of carbon dioxide that is produced by 1.5 million cars.

Opponents Say:

- Ending a tax is a good idea.
- Fees for users would be a better way to fund the parks.

Chamber Position: SUPPORT

Measure WW specifically funds improvements and expansion to East Bay Regional park land in Fremont, including Ardenwood (\$2,250,000), Coyote Hills (\$8,100,000), Mission Peak (\$5,400,000), Quarry Lakes (\$4,500,000), and the Vargas Plateau (\$7,649,000). It also allocates \$9,758,562 directly to Fremont for local park and recreation projects. This is a quality of life issue that makes our community a more attractive place to businesses, employees, and residents. It represents a continuation, rather than an incremental tax, and provides significant benefit directly to Fremont.
