Fremont Chamber of Commerce Gives Nod to Local **Education and Transportation Measures:**

The Fremont Chamber of Commerce has always placed a high priority on quality public education and transportation infrastructure as key factors in attracting the best businesses and jobs to our area and our State. Given the current State budget crisis, and the State's propensity to borrow and take away funds, the Chamber believes that the following three local funding measures are worthwhile investments in our students, our schools, and our infrastructure. Best of all, none of these funds are subject to State

Measure F - Alameda County Transportation Improvement Measure: SUPPORT

Background: A recent study conducted by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission projected a 25-year funding shortfall for street and road work of over \$3 billion county-wide and \$748 million in Fremont alone. This same study projected a similar shortfall for transit.

Measure Description: Measure F authorizes a \$10 increase in Vehicle Registration fees within Alameda County

to be used for local transportation and transit improvements. The expenditure plan for this measure dictates that the funds be allocated to various needs as follows: 60% to local road improvement and repair; 25% to congestion relief; 10% to transportation technology such as traffic signal coordination, traffic management systems and infrastructure for alternative fuel vehicles; 5% to pedestrian and bicyclist access and safety. It is estimated that this fee will generate up to \$11 million per year in Alameda County, with roughly

\$2.7 million per year coming to the Tri-Cities. Of this, Fremont would receive about \$1.5 million annually \$900,000 of which would be dedicated to fixing roads. For more information on Measure F, visit their website: www.alamedacountyvrf.org.

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. \$11 million per year (or \$1.5 million to Fremont) will not solve all our problems, but it will make a noticeable dif-

The November 2010 ballot presents voters with 9 propositions. The Fremont Chamber of Commerce takes positions on measures that we believe will have a clear and direct impact on our business community, the economic vitality of our area, and the overall quality of life in Fremont. The Fremont Chamber Board of Directors has reviewed all of the measures on this upcoming ballot and made recommendations on five of them: Propositions 22, 23, 24, 25 and 27. The Board decided not to weigh in on Propositions 19, 20 and 21.

Proposition 26 generated considerable debate among board members, but did not result in a recommendation as of press time. Should the board decide to make a recommendation on this measure, we will post the recommendation in our weekly e-newsletter, Top of the Week, and on our website.

The following includes a summary of each ballot measure, including pros and cons, and a fiscal impact assessment by California's non-partisan Legislative Analyst. If the Fremont Chamber has taken a position, a rationale for the Board's recommendation is given.

Proposition 19

Legalizes marijuana under California but not Federal law. Permits local governments to regulate and tax commercial production, distribution, and sale of marijuana. Initiative Statute

More Specifics: Allows people 21 years old or older to possess, cultivate, or transport up to one ounce of marijuana for personal use. Permits local governments to regulate and tax commercial production and sale of marijuana. Prohibits marijuana on school grounds, using it in public, smoking it while minors are present. Maintains current prohibitions against driving while impaired. Limits employers' ability to address marijuana use to situations where job performance is actually impaired.

Fiscal Impact: Potential increased tax and fee revenues in the hundreds of millions annually and potential correctional savings of several tens of millions of dollars annually

Supporters say:

- Regulating and taxing cannabis, as we do alcohol and cigarettes, will generate billions in revenue and help fund jobs, health care, school, libraries, and roads
- California wastes millions of dollars a year on failed marijuana prohibition - money which could be better spent combating violent crime and
- The illegality of cannabis enables an out-of-control criminal market.

Supporters Include: Alameda County Supervisor Nate Miley, Congressman Pete Stark, Oakland City Council, retired San Jose Police Chief Joseph McNamara

Opponents say:

- Proposition 19 raises significant liability issues for businesses.
- Prop 19 prevents employers from being able to enforce Federal drug-free workplace rules and could result in employers losing federal contracts and grants
- K-University schools in California could stand to lose as much as \$9.4 billion in federal funding.
- Proposition 19 would require the employer to prove that an employee is "actually impaired" as a result of marijuana use, as opposed to current law which allows employers to discipline employees who are "under the influence" of drugs or alcohol.
- Since a large segment of marijuana

ference. Jim Pierson, Transportation Director for the City of Fremont, provided some examples of what could be done with \$900,000 for road repair: it would provide enough asphalt to fix almost 10,000 potholes or pay for slurry sealing of approximately 61 lane miles. Additionally, these funds will allow us to leverage additional funding from the state and federal governments. Good roads and transit systems are a significant factor in attracting businesses and jobs to an area, while poor roads cost drivers in terms of wear and tear on vehicles. When evaluating any additional fees during an economy like this, we have to weigh the benefit versus the cost; for \$10 per vehicle per year, this seems like a good investment to us.

Measure K – Fremont Unified School District Local Funding Measure: SUP-PORT

Background: Successive state fiscal crises leading to more than \$20 million in local school funding cuts have resulted in serious negative impacts to Fremont schools, including increased class sizes, program reductions, and reductions in specialty teachers.

Measure Description: Measure K levies a \$53 per parcel tax on real property located within the City of Fremont for a period of 5 years, and is projected to raise over \$3 million annually. The funds would be dedicated to maintaining math, science, reading and writing programs; keeping school libraries open; supporting classroom/learning technology; maintaining college and workforce preparation programs; and retaining qualified teachers in FUSD schools. No funds will be used for administrators' salaries. If passed, senior citizens can request an exemption, and there will be a citizens' oversight committee to ensure the funds are spent as approved. The parcel tax sunsets after 5 years, and cannot be renewed without voter approval. For more information on Measure K, visit www.yesonkforkids.com

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. Measure K will provide a source of local and stable fund-

ing for FUSD schools that cannot be taken away by the State. While the funds raised by this proposal will not prevent all the cuts, a source of locally controlled funds that are not subject to State takeaway can help prevent some of the more devastating cuts and can help maintain the high quality schools for which Fremont is known. Fremont Unified's last funding measure, the 2002 Health and Safety Bond, was completed successfully within budget, and the School Board's conservative fiscal management over the years has allowed the District to weather the economic storm better than many other districts. The Chamber believes that our students and our schools need and deserve our support for Measure K.

Measure G – Ohlone College Job Training / Quality Education Local Bond: SUP-PORT

Background: Many of the buildings on the Ohlone Fremont campus were built in the 1970's and are in need of significant upgrades and renovation. Additionally, the costs to attend the State and University of California colleges continue to increase with the State budget crisis, and remain substantially higher than the costs to attend Ohlone - resulting in increased demand for Ohlone courses. Unfortunately, hundreds of students have been turned away.

Measure Description: Measure G is a \$349 million bond measure that will upgrade buildings to current earthquake and fire safety standards; repair and replace aging plumbing, sewer, utility, and HVAC systems; repair and replace worn-out roofs; improve access for the disabled; improve insulation, replace windows and upgrade utility infrastructure to reduce energy costs; upgrade technology and telecommunications systems; install enhanced security; renovate classrooms and science labs; and expand classroom capacity by 25%. Impact to property taxes will be \$19.95 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation.

Chamber Position: SUPPORT. This measure will allow Ohlone College to upgrade, retrofit, or replace its older facilities and equipment and will expand classroom capacity by 25%, so that the

college can continue to meet the needs of our community. As with the FUSD parcel tax, these are funds that cannot be taken away by the State. Bond funds can only be used for the acquisition, construction, replacement or rehabilitation of school facilities and equipment. Significant accountability is built into the measure, which requires annual performance and financial audits and a citizens' oversight committee.

The Chamber believes that Ohlone College is a significant asset to our community, helping to provide affordable post-secondary education to students, enabling transfers to 4-year colleges, and providing job training and retraining in growth industries to students of all ages within the Tri-City area. These services are more needed now than ever. If we in the Tri-Cities do not make this investment now, the facilities will continue to degrade and the costs to upgrade will only increase. Ohlone has a proven track record with its management of its prior bond, and we believe this measure warrants our support.

BOTTOM LINE: The Chamber encourages you to vote YES on Measures F, K and G on the upcoming November ballot.

With regards to Measure F, we believe that our surface roads and our transportation infrastructure can be an attraction or a deterrent when companies are considering where to locate. We need them to serve as an attraction. With regards to education measures K and G, we know that companies consider availability of a skilled and highly educated workforce when evaluating places to locate. They also look at what areas boast a school system that will be attractive to their employees and families. We believe that our local and regional economy will benefit from these investments in our students and future workforce.

We know that these are tough times, and we are very careful before we recommend taxes and fees that increase burdens on taxpayers and business. However, we also believe that these three measures will reap dividends in the years to come.

Business for Good Government



What is Business for Good Government (BGG)?

Business for Good Government (BGG) is an affiliated political action committee of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce, authorized by the State of California and the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) to raise funds, endorse candidates, and contribute to ballot measures or candidate campaigns. BGG plays an active role in the support of business interests in local, regional, and state elections.

Officially, BGG is classified by the State of California as "a general purpose sponsored recipient committee of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce." Essentially, this is a political action committee, or PAC, that operates at the state rather than the federal level.

Why was BGG formed?

Formed by the Chamber's Board of Directors in 1995 to help elect candidates who are sensitive to business issues, BGG furthers the business community's efforts to have a voice in the political process. The bylaws of BGG read, "The purpose of BUSI-NESS FOR GOOD GOVERNMENT is to help protect, preserve and further good government, foster a political environment that will strengthen the private enterprise system, and endorse and promote candidates who support the priorities and mission of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce."

BGG is able to raise funds for its endorsed candidates or to support Chamber positions on ballot measures that impact business. Such activities, if carried out by the Chamber, could jeopardize its tax-exempt non-profit designation. On the other hand, BGG is legally authorized by the State of California to raise and spend funds for these purposes

Although the Chamber communicates its legislative priorities and positions on issues to BGG, BGG's endorsements of candidates are made completely independently.

How is BGG structured?

BGG has its own board of directors, independent of the Chamber's board of directors. It has complete control over any endorsements it chooses to make, and since it is responsible for its own fundraising, it also has complete control over its expenditures. BGG trustees serve consecutive oneyear terms until resignation or removal, and BGG is completely independent of any political party, political organization, or candidate.

What can BGG do?

BGG can endorse and contribute money to candidates or ballot measures. It can promote its candidate endorsements to the Fremont Chamber membership, organize phone banking and other "get out the vote" activities, and spend funds to create campaign materials or events.

Endorsements for Local Races

BGG backs Natarajan and Harrison for City Council

Business for Good Government, the Political Action Committee of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce, has placed its confidence in incumbents Anu Natarajan and Bill Harrison for Fremont City Council. With a field of ten candidates, this is a highly contested race, and most candidates expressed their desire for a vibrant and thriving community, attracting well-paid jobs, responsive to business and community needs, and able to provide

expanded amenities to its residents and workers. Nevertheless, among these candidates, BGG felt that Natarajan and Harrison stood out.

It is easy to talk about what you will do, but Natarajan and Harrison have helped navigate our City through the worst recession in recent times. Despite State takeaways,

lowered sales and property tax revenues, the loss of NUMMI, and other very real and personal local job losses, Fremont has stayed on relatively solid footing overall through careful fiscal management and proactive economic development and local stimulus measures.

In looking at what has happened in Fremont over the past four years, BGG believes that on balance, we have seen many positive developments. Fremont has attracted many new, highprofile businesses, in technology, biomed, and green tech, including Solyndra, Solaria, Tesla, Transcontinental, WaferGen Biosystems, AnaSpec, and Mentor Graphics. Pacific Commons continues to expand and will be adding a Nordstrom Rack and a movie theater. Fremont has worked with regional agencies to fund infrastructure improvements - such as the I-880/Mission Blvd. interchange, the award-winning Washington Blvd. grade separation, and BART to Warm Springs - and to extend the redevelopment cap in order to fund critical revitalization of our historic districts. Aqua Adventure was completed and is adding money to our local economy, and we have opened the Always Dream Playpark, the Dog Park, and acquired over 115 acres of park land.

The City Council has played a key role in economic development by authorizing a local stimulus package to attract green tech companies, promote purchasing from local vendors, and spur development in the midtown. And the City has applied for and received Federal funds and is undertaking a study to determine the best and most productive use of the former NUMMI

and South Fremont properties around the BART station.

Additionally, Natarajan and Harrison stood out with respect to the unique expertise and perspective they each bring to Council, their understanding of the complex challenges facing our City as it grows into a vital participant in the Silicon Valley economy, and their concrete ideas for how to move us towards the thriving and vibrant Fremont of the future.



Anu Natarajan is completing her sixth year on the City Council, having first been appointed to fill a vacancy in 2004 and then re-elected in 2006. She brings extensive knowledge of urban planning and design to her role, including a Bachelors degree in Architecture, a Masters in Urban Design & Planning, and work experience as an architect, public agency planner and urban planning consultant in the Bay Area and oversees. Prior to her appointment to Council, she served as a Fremont Planning Commissioner. And since last year, Natarajan has worked as a program manager with the American Leadership Forum, a network of regional leaders committed to building stronger communities through collaborative leadership, a discussion of complex issues and policy recommendations. Particularly through this current job, Natarajan has gained a greater understanding of regional issues and best practices while developing relationships with Silicon Valley leaders and promoting Fremont as an integral part of Silicon Valley.

As part of the current Council, Anu represents Fremont on many regional boards, including StopWaste. Org, the BART to San Jose Policy Committee, the Dumbarton Express Policy Committee, and the Alameda County Housing Authority. She is truly a powerhouse when it comes to understanding regional issues and advocacy for Fremont's place of importance in our regional economy.

Anu states her top priorities are bringing jobs to Fremont, developing opportunities for 'fun' in Fremont, and ensuring that Fremont continues to be a great place to live. Expanding on the

topic of economic development, Natarajan says she is proud of the businesses and restaurants that Fremont has attracted over the past few years but adds that we need to be more aggressive in courting businesses we want, and that we need to do a better job of promoting and creating an identity for Fremont. She notes that it is critical for Fremont to expand its representation on regional boards and committees, that we need to become more active participants in Silicon Valley organizations and business groups, and that we should consider strategic partnerships with other cities to promote Fremont as part of a regional hub in clean and green technology. Lastly, Natarajan believes we should be creative in developing incubator space for start-ups by partnering with the owners of the over 5.5 million square feet of vacant building stock in Fremont.

Other areas of focus for Natarajan include creating a midtown that is a 'civic center' for the City; using redevelopment dollars to revitalize our historic districts; enhancing our transit infrastructure; expanding entertainment and recreational opportunities within Fremont; and broadening available housing choices.

On being told of her endorsement by BGG, Natarajan said, "I am honored to be endorsed by BGG. I see the Chamber as an important partner in achieving the goal of attracting new businesses and strengthening Fremont's position as a regional hub for green tech businesses."



Bill Harrison is a lifelong resident of Fremont, a CPA, and the co-owner of Harrison Accounting Group, who notes that "he is the only member of Council who has signed both sides of a paycheck." Bill was elected to the Fremont City Council in 2006 after having served on the Planning Commission from 2001-2006. He brings his experience as a successful small

business owner and his expertise in business economics and accounting to his position as a City Councilmember. Harrison has long been active in the community, as an active member of Kiwanis, serving on the boards of several non-profit children's charities, and as a member of the Centerville & City of Fremont Combined Project Area Committee. As a member of Council, he serves on the Warm Springs BART Policy Advisory Committee and the Sunol Express Lane Joint Powers Authority.

He states his priorities are jobs and the economy; the housing market; and public safety. Elaborating on the topic of jobs and the economy, Bill highlights our recent successes in attracting large companies like Solvndra and Tesla and smaller companies like AnaSpec, a biotech firm, to Fremont. But, like Natarajan, he believes that we can do more - from continued simplification of the permitting process to marketing our City more effectively within Silicon Valley. He notes that we have a major asset here that many cities do not - lots of land at an affordable price. He also notes that our diverse population makes us uniquely suited to serving as a test market for companies, and that we should do more to capitalize on this asset.

Harrison notes that encouraging businesses to locate and stay in Fremont will not only create jobs, but will also help to stimulate the housing market and will bring revenue to our City that can then be used to reinstate and improve City services. He adds that fully funding our police and fire departments is a priority so that we can keep our neighborhoods, workers and residents safe.

When told of his endorsement, Bill said, "I'm honored to have the endorsement of the PAC of the Fremont Chamber because we share the same goal - to create jobs and improve our local economy. I look forward to working with the Fremont Chamber for another term on important economic issues"

Fiscal Impact: The financial impact of this would vary. In any year that the Legislature does not sent a budget to the Governor on time, there would be a reduction in state legislator compensation costs of about \$50,000 per day.

- Majority rule is a fundamental part of democracy. There are only 3 states, including California, that require a 2/ 3rds vote or more of the legislature to pass a budget.
- Prop 25 will reduce the stranglehold the minority now exercises over the process.
- Late budgets deprive individuals and families of essential government services and subject businesses to protracted delays in payments. Last year, California was forced to issue over 450,000 IOUs worth \$2.6 billion.



AC Transit Awarded \$5.4 Million for Fleet Maintenance as It Celebrates 50 Years of Service!

October 1, 2010 was the 50th anniversary of the Alameda - Contra Costa Transit District (AC Transit). On that same day, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) awarded AC Transit \$5.4 million through the Obama Administration's new State of Good Repair program, designed to improve the state of the nation's transit systems

AC Transit's application was selected on a competitive basis. The funds were awarded to upgrade AC Transit's maintenance software and to develop new state-of-the-art processes for maintaining its fleet of over 600 buses. The project will help AC Transit improve system-wide performance and reduce costs associated with maintaining its vehicles.

"This is extremely good news for our agency and could not have come at a more opportune time for us, given our current financial challenges," said AC Transit Interim General Manager Mary King.

Since its inception on October

1, 1960, AC Transit has evolved into an operation that carries more than 64 million passengers annually through two counties and 13 cities with around-the-clock service across the San Francisco Bay. It has also won numerous awards and recognition for innovation and environmental technology.

Most recently, the transit agency announced that it will discontinue the sale of paper tickets as of November 1, 2010, and will transition to reloadable Clipper cards instead. To help with the transition, AC Transit will provide the Clipper cards for free for a limited time. The cards can then be preloaded with cash or a 31-day pass. Fremont Unified School District (FUSD) Shows Strong Gains in API Scores

The California Department of Education's annual Accountability Progress Report shows that the Fremont Unified School District has continued to achieve strong gains in the Academic Performance Index (API). The API is one measure of Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and is given on a scale of 200-1000 with schools scoring above 800 ranked as "high performing." FUSD's 2010 district API growth score remains strong at 868, an increase of 9 points from last year's base API.

"This District's academic gains are built on a foundation of good teaching, but continuous improvement only happens when we all work together," said Dr. Morris, FUSD Superintendent. "These impressive test scores require the work of committed students, dedicated teachers, involved parents, and the support of our secretaries, bus drivers, cafeteria workers, custodians, etc. Every employee plays a role in the success of our students."

Thirty-two of FUSD's 42 schools maintained or increased from their 2009 base API score. A few highlights from this year's report include:

- 25 of the 28 elementary schools, 4 of the 5 junior high schools, and 2 of the 5 comprehensive high schools have API scores above 800, ranking them as "high performing."
- 18 schools posted double-digit increases in their API score.

FUSD uses an on-line assessment reporting and analysis system to better examine students' specific skill strengths and weaknesses. With this tool and other resources and supports, schools will be better able to provide the needed strategies to help all of our students succeed. Green Technology and the clean tech movement are capturing national attention as policies ranging from energy to national security stress energy independence as a priority. In Fremont, the clean tech sector continues to grow as we see new, innovative clean tech startups, as well as established industry giants choose Fremont as the location for their business.

Solyndra, Fremont's largest solar firm, has nearly completed construction of their new expanded headquarters and fabrication facility. Last year, the company received a \$535 million loan guarantee from the U.S. government for the completion of this facility and President Obama visited the company in May to promote the fed-

electric cars available to mainstream consumers. They are catalyzing change in the industry. Tesla vehicles and electric vehicles powered by Tesla are designed to be fun to drive and environmentally responsible.

Along with these large clean tech companies, Fremont is home to a num-

ber of exciting clean tech startups. For example, Solaria Corporation, a global manufacturer of solar photovoltaic modules, recently announced that it raised more than anticipated in its Se-

ries D financing round. The round's total of \$65 million dollars-which includes \$10 million in a growth loan facility-is \$20 million above company's original target, demonstrating investor and industry confidence in Solaria's

groundbreaking solar modules and technology. The company is in the process of expanding to a new site in Ardenwood, which will double their size in Fremont!

Fremont has been fortunate to capture a significant amount of venture capital investment, which is critical for emerging firms. In 2008 and 2009, the East Bay Area received roughly 6% of all venture capital in the nation and of that. Fremont received 1/3 of the East Bay investment in 2008 and 1/2 of the East Bay investment in 2009. Of all East Bay Area venture capital investment, the clean tech sector received the largest share. And relative to clean tech sectors in other East Bay Area cities, Fremont's clean tech sector received the most investment in both 2008 and 2009. Research suggests that the high level of government investment, such as federal loan guarantees, helps drive these private invest-

The City of Fremont remains committed to attracting clean tech companies to build on this already successful industry cluster and to working closely with existing companies to ensure that they grow and thrive here. We recently conducted a survey of our clean tech companies and compared our practices with other cities to ensure we are a location of choice. We sure we are a location of choice. We confirmed that our quality workforce and customer service have been ex-

tremely beneficial to our business community. We will continue to promote Fremont's strategic advantages and work to assist growing firms with their unique needs. We know that our ability to provide exceptional customer service is critical to ensuring we are a business-friendly city. City staff and its interaction with local businesses is one of our greatest economic development tools. We want all businesses to know that we will work tirelessly to help them succeed in Fremont!
